Selectmen's Report March, 2024

Greetings to all,

As we look forward to another Town meeting, the Select Board would like to thank the citizens of Sedgwick for their continued support.

In late fall of 2023, the solar project adjacent to Caterpillar Hill finally came online. The board continues to monitor the early production state of this project. This coming October will signal a start of revenues due the Town that are maintained by prior binding agreements. Additionally, the fulfillment of landowner agreements with the operator will continue to be monitored closely.

Recent winter storms have challenged our local infrastructure and caused immeasurable destruction to properties along our shores. The Town is working with Federal, State and County Emergency Management to direct damage reports and assessments to the appropriate body. The board encourages anyone sustaining damage caused by the storm to report such losses to the Hancock County EMA office via their website, or in the case of limited or no internet capability, in writing or digital form to the Select Board as soon as possible.

Although generally a protective harbor, the SSE wind directions sustained during two of the larger storms battered the town dock on Carter Point. The Town is working

closely with the Town engineer and local contractors to coordinate repairs to the town dock. A diligent effort is underway, with the upcoming commercial fishing and recreational boating seasons fast approaching.

Work on an updated Comprehensive Plan is in full swing. This is a challenging task to say the least, however Comprehensive Planning Committee Chair Donna Beninati, the committee membership and the Planning Board have been moving things along vigorously. A major part of this process is the public hearings and informational meetings. Maximizing participation in this process will allow the committee to better understand what priorities Town citizens see as a benefit to, or in protection of the Town moving forward. Another notable element is the guidelines and requirements set forth by the State of Maine regarding such plans, which are due for update at least every 10 years. Approval of such a plan will be presented to the legislative body prior to submission to the State of Maine.

Finally, once again, we would like to thank our volunteers, as well as our board and committee members for their steadfast service to the town. The functions of a small town would not be possible without such dedication to service.

In closing, we again like to thank you, the legislative body, for your continued support.

Report from Jared Golden 2nd District of Maine United States Congress

Dear Friends.

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It's an honor to continue serving as your representative in Congress, and I take the responsibility very seriously. I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I've been working on behalf of the people of the Second Congressional District.

Maine's heritage industries are the backbone of our state's economy. That is why one of the first bills I introduced in this Congress was the *Northeast Fisheries Heritage Protection Act*, which would prohibit commercial offshore wind energy development in Lobster Management Area 1 (LMA 1) in the Gulf of Maine. LMA 1 was identified by the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management (BOEM) as a potential offshore wind site. LMA 1 is a critical and highly productive fishing ground for a variety of sea life, including lobster. Prohibiting offshore and wind development in LMA 1 would help to avoid conflict with the New England commercial and recreational fishing industries. Additionally, the bill would initiate a federal study on the environmental review processes of any relevant Federal agencies for offshore wind projects in the Gulf of Maine.

I also continue to advocate on behalf of our veterans and those providing care to our former service members. The current pay for VA employees in the Kennebec and Penobscot counties does not reflect the critical services they are providing. As the oldest state in the nation, with the fifth highest veteran population, Mainers rely on the services offered at the Department of Veteran Affairs (VA) facilities. That's why recently, Senator Collins, Senator King, Representative Pingree and I called on the Biden Administration to increase locality pay for VA employees in

Kennebec and Penobscot counties. The level of care received is impacted by job vacancies, and the high turnover rate among its healthcare workforce is often the result of pay and compensation issues, which is further exacerbated by the increased cost of living.

Lastly, I'm excited that Mainers are continuing to reap the benefits of the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* (BIL). Recently, millions of dollars in grants have been awarded across the state, including \$35 Million through the US Department of Transportation's Culvert Aquatic Organism Passage (AOP) program to conserve spawning and migratory habitats for native fish species in Maine, \$460,000 through the Airport Infrastructure Grant (AIG) program for the Princeton Municipal Airport, Stephen A. Bean Municipal Airport, and Dexter Regional Airport, and nearly \$8 million through the Buses and Bus Facilities Program for Bangor's bus system. These investments are critical to ensuring Maine's infrastructure and will help to

ensure Mainers and businesses across Maine are connected.

Regardless of the year, one of my top priorities is ensuring I'm accessible to you. My staff and I can help answer questions about and navigate federal programs find resources in Maine; and resolve issues with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, and other federal agencies and programs. Dear Sedgwick Neighbors:

I remain humbled and grateful to serve as your representative in the Maine House of Representatives. When I was elected in 2022, I assured you that I would tackle some of Maine's most pressing issues and I have been working hard in Augusta to do exactly that. Thank you for trusting me with this important role. The first session of the 131st Legislature made transformational investments in the lives of Maine people, making it easier for more folks to make ends meet and to help create communities where all Mainers can thrive, including folks right here in Sedgwick.

The legislature invested in the well-being of Maine workers and families by establishing a comprehensive paid family and medical leave program, increasing funding for Pre-K and child care support and taking significant steps to address Maine's significant shortage of affordable and available housing. These issues still require attention and I will continue to work on them. Additionally, two bills that I sponsored are now law, including one that requires all on- duty uniformed patrol officers to carry naloxone hydrochloride, also known as Narcan.

As of this writing, we have begun the second regular session of the 131st Legislature. We will consider hundreds of bills before we adjourn, which will likely be in mid-April. Once again, I am proud to serve on the Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee, where we work on issues related to criminal law and procedure, supporting our first responders and keeping Mainers safe. In addition to committee work, substance use disorder is one of my focal points in the legislature and I continue to work with a variety of stakeholders to improve access to safety and treatment for folks who suffer, often in silence, from this devastating issue. I

will also be working hard to ensure ongoing funding for community organizations who support domestic and sexual violence victims.

Sedgwick Budget Committee Report January 26, 2024

The town budget committee met through December and January using the town's phone conference call system. We spent time reviewing in detail all the non-profit requests by scanning the information submitted for distribution to the committee members, which allowed all members to review the details in the requests. Each organization is asked to provide an indication of the number of Sedgwick residents assisted, the services provided, the fee structure if any, and most importantly the funding sources for their programs. A majority of the organizations provided audited financial statements as well. We requested meetings with all who requested sums over \$2,000 and arranged phone meetings to discuss the services they provide. The deadline for submission of material stayed at December 31, 2023, and unfortunately there were some who failed to meet that guideline, as was the case last year. The committee tried to balance the cost of services provided to our community with the recognition of taxpayer interests in minimizing increases. The social service request form for funding is posted on the town's website under forms.

Our committee also reviewed the budget of the town's fire department. The increase in the fire department budget was mostly due to increased costs for mandated inspections and services. Given the effects of inflation, the fire equipment reserve account amount was again increased as the department looks to the future. We met with selectmen to review the town's warrant articles with minor changes as the selectmen worked to keep figures down. A few accounts saw modest increases due to areas that require additional funding. Continuing account balances were considered as well as the availability of surplus. For several accounts, e.g. County tax, the transfer station and the Hancock County Communications Center – the town lacks budget authority. The school board committee bears responsibility for the town's school budget, which constitutes the majority of town costs.

"Thank you's are extended to the many community members who volunteer their time for the benefit of the community and the many community members who receive stipends that do not fully reflect the value they provide to our town. There are volunteers on many town committees, and those interested in serving the town should stand up and express a willingness to help plan for the town's future. We hope all citizens will make an effort to attend and vote at town meeting.

CEO Report

In the past year the Planning Board put together some updates in the Shoreland Zoning at the town meeting to restore and clarify minimum lot sizes and shore frontage in the Shoreland Zone. Retiring Planning Board member, Andy Bowes, provided excellent assistance on this matter and he will be missed now that he has retired. We all appreciate the service of all the Planning Board members and will also miss the contributions and expertise of retiring board member, Peter Neill.

With Covid being mostly over, things are getting back to normal and State sponsored trainings are coming back. One problem that exists is the lack of staff at D.E.P. Normally the Bangor office of D.E.P. handles inquiries but now they are getting assistance from the Augusta office due to the work overload the Bangor office is receiving.

The State has automatic building codes for towns over 4,000 in population which adds about \$2,000 or more to the cost of a new home. It also inhibits people from doing work themselves as an "Occupancy Permit" then becomes required (because someone can occupy their house). It is not now. And so far, none of the towns around the Peninsula here have opted to bring in the Maine Uniform Building and Energy Code (M.U.B.E.C.,). Generally all of the towns in this greater Peninsula area have workable ordinances.

Comprehensive Plan Committee Report

A comprehensive plan serves as a road map for sustainable and balanced development, ensuring the long-term resilience, vitality, and rural character of our town.

Sedgwick adopted its first comprehensive plan in 1974, completed detailed revisions in 1980 and created a new comprehensive plan adopted by the legislative body in 1993. Today, in coordination with the Town of Sedgwick Planning Board, development of an updated comprehensive plan is underway to provide legal protection for our ordinances, help the town qualify for preferred status with state competitive grant programs, guide state growth-related capital investment towards locally chosen growth areas, sustain rural loving, preserve a healthy landscape, balance economic prosperity with quality of life, protect working waterfronts and community farms, and develop a basis for sound decisions in town management.

Preliminary work on revisions to the comprehensive plan began with the Planning Board in early 2023 with formal work commencing immediately following approval of the warrant article by the legislative body to fund updating the comprehensive plan during the 2023 Annual Town Meeting.

In July 2023 an online public survey and over 1,000 mailed paper surveys were released to obtain input from all landowners and all household residents of Sedgwick for input to help shape the Town's future through the comprehensive planning process. A total of 164 responses were received and survey results are posted to the Town website. In September 2023, a public presentation by Corinne Michaud-LeBlanc, Climate Coordinator

in the Beginning with Habitat Program at the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife was held about the Natural Resources in Sedgwick. Ten residents attended. In January 2024, a public presentation by John W. Egan Senior Program Officer for Strategic Initiatives with the Genesis Fund, was held on Housing Issues and Solutions. Fourteen Sedgwick residents attended; total attendees were nineteen.

Levine Planning Strategies working with North Star Planning is working on Phase 1 of the project required inventory sections for the Sedgwick Comprehensive Plan consistent with the Growth Management Act (30-A M.R.S.A §4312-4350) and with the state's Comprehensive Plan Review Criteria Rules. Draft inventory sections for Historic, Water Resources, Natural Resources, Agriculture & Forests, Marine Resources, Recreation, Transportation and Existing Land Use Maps have been created and are under review. The remaining inventory sections are still being developed by the consultants. Expected completion of Phase 1 includes feedback from the Town and is expected in early March.

Phase II will include development and publication of goal and policy statements, future land use plan, capital investment and implementation plan, final plan draft and electronic submission to the state for consistency with Maine's Growth Management Act. Target timeframe for the legislative body to adopt the updated Comprehensive Plan is the 2025 Annual Town Meeting.

Additional public information sessions are planned for 2024, support and participation from all community members is appreciated. We encourage the widest possible involvement by Sedgwick citizens in all aspects of the planning and implementation process to ensure that the plan has the benefit of citizen input.

The Comprehensive Plan Committee meets together with the Planning Board every month on the second Tuesday at 7 p.m. at the Sedgwick Town Office. Meetings are open to the public and any Sedgwick resident is welcome to attend.

The Sedgwick Volunteer Fire Department had a very busy year in 2023. We continue to be paged out to incidents with the Deer Isle and Stonington Fire Departments. This agreement continues to be mutually beneficial in providing fire protection in the three communities. Our volunteer fire department responded to 235 incidents for a total of 1135.5 hours in 2023. Our volunteers also spent 1561 hours in training in 2023. A vast amount of time has also been spent in monthly meetings, committee meetings, Hancock County Firefighters Association meetings, fire prevention activities, fundraising activities and work sessions.

The department wishes to thank the residents, town officials and taxpayers for your continued support. Your support is essential to the future of the department. We continue to strive to be the best we can be.

The department received an Assistance to Firefighter's Grant in 2023 for \$84,000 to purchase 15 complete sets of turnout gear coats, pants, helmets, flash hoods, gloves and boots, 4 thermal imaging cameras and 2 four gas meters. This grant program is 95% funded by the federal government with a 5% town match. This award will be a great benefit to the department. The department also received a Maine Municipal Association Safety Grant to purchase traffic control equipment. The town received a grant to install heat pumps in a couple of areas in the stations. We hope these heat pumps will cut our heating costs.

In late 2023, we purchased a used rescue truck from the town of Old Forge, New York to replace the current rescue truck that we had outgrown. Five department members traveled to Old Forge on a weekend in August, purchased the truck and made the 10 hour drive back to Sedgwick with the new truck. The truck is in excellent condition for its age and will serve us very well in the upcoming years. We also purchased a complete set of used extrication tools from two Hancock County fire departments to work with the system that is on the new rescue truck.

Remember, to reach any emergency services for the town of Sedgwick, you must dial **911**. The E911 system gives the dispatchers the exact location an emergency call is coming from, thus saving emergency responders critical time by providing better directions to the emergency. Be prepared to answer any questions that the dispatcher may

ask. This information is critical for a timely, correct response to the emergency. Please answer the questions asked and stay on the line until the dispatcher tells you to hang up.

Fire safety needs to be practiced in each and every home. Smoke detectors should be located on each level of your home. Check and test them regularly. Clean them and replace the batteries twice a year. Replace the smoke detector every 10 years. Develop home fire drills, preplan your escape routes and practice them regularly. Establish a safe meeting area outside the building. If you have any questions, contact the fire department.

Open burning permits are only available online at Maine Open Burn Permit. There is no charge for the permit and it is valid for 24 hours. Remember, you must have a permit to engage in any outdoor burning.

I want to thank our volunteer firefighters for their dedicated service to the Town of Sedgwick and surrounding communities. Our firefighters give a tremendous amount of time and many times risk their lives to protect our citizens and property. Our firefighters do their job for the pride and satisfaction of providing a great service to our town. They are a very dedicated group of people. We are very lucky to have them.

Blue Hill Heritage Trust

Blue Hill Heritage Trust's (BHHT) mission is, "to lead in conserving land, water and wildlife habitat on the greater Blue Hill Peninsula. To teach and practice a stewardship ethic. To promote ecological, economic, and community health for this and future generations." Much of our work is future-focused, looking to protect and enhance the long-term health of both land and people, and Blue Hill Heritage Trust is committed to both conserving land in our towns and serving those communities.

2023 was a good year for BHHT. We added to our staff, as the work of stewarding our land, maintaining our trails, and engaging with the public continues to grow. We also had one of our best years in land protection, conserving 764 acres on the peninsula. About half of this was focused on recreational access, especially the land on Wallamatogus Mountain in Penobscot, while the other half prioritized habitat protection.

The big project we completed in Sedgwick this year was the Peter Clapp accessible trail on Caterpillar Hill. This trail crosses our Cooper Farm property and is built to be useable by people of all abilities. The trail has picnic areas and interpretive signage, and we

hope that it will be a great addition to what is already one of the most beautiful places in Maine.

We want to thank all our Sedgwick supporters for being our partners in this work. We did not add any conservation acres in town last year. In 2023, the Trust voluntarily paid \$8,366 in real estate taxes to the town and a total of \$48,283 to all the towns in which we hold land.

We are looking forward to another great year in 2024 and hope to see many of you out enjoying the land and waters $\,$

Blue Hill Public Library Municipal Report 2023-2024

Summary

2023 was the bounce-back year that we have been waiting for after the disruptions of the Covid-19 pandemic. It was a year when the investments in facilities and public services of recent years began to show great results.

Many of you know that the library's historic main reading room, the Adelaide Pearson Room, is now reconfigurable into a public gathering space for lectures, concerts, etc. thanks to renovations that took place in 2022. This has become a useful and versatile space for larger gatherings including popular author events, dances, film festivals, and the annual Friends Community Holiday Party.

The Elvira Bass Room, the smaller meeting room in the basement, has become a destination for meetings from 1-12 people. Remote job interviews, smaller non-profit meetings, and tutoring sessions are all held there anytime the library is open. In the age of online meetings, this has become an in-demand resource.

Less prominent, the library's Archive and Museum room was improved during 2023, thanks to private donations. Dense compact shelving was installed to double the overall available shelf feet. Community treasures are securely preserved and accessed from this room in climate-controlled conditions.

The library has also invested in early childhood development. Thanks to grant funding, both the Youth Services Librarian and Library Director have been trained for "Family Place Libraries," a program that works towards making libraries "vital centers for early learning, parent engagement, family support and community connectivity, ensuring children get the best start in life." This is a continuation and enhancement of work that the library has been doing for many years.

Additionally, under a cooperative arrangement with George Stevens Academy, to help with what we hope is a temporary budget gap, our Teen Librarian has become their librarian during school hours. GSA has hired her for a portion of her time, with BHPL paying the remaining majority of her 20 hours of weekly service at GSA.

Library Funding

The library's operating income comes from three main sources: municipal funding (15% of the total, most of which is from Blue Hill, with additional funds from Penobscot, Sedgwick and Surry), annual fundraising (35% derived from events, the annual fund, etc.) and operating income (50% primarily from the library's endowment funds). For 2024, the library's operating budget is \$799,320. This provides six days, 55 hours of weekly business hours, 8.4 FTE staff members, and all of the activities below.

An active Friends of the Library group provides funding for a significant portion of the library's outreach events for all ages, as well as other items and services not provided by the operating budget. While we think of these things as "extras", BHPL would be a very different library without their contribution.

2023 Activities

From a public services perspective, 2023 reached pre-pandemic levels and our content usage and program attendance surpassed the 2019 pre-covid levels. Over our 295 service days the library:

- Loaned 102,834 physical and digital items (books, audiobooks, movies, etc.). Use of the physical items in the library collection increased by 6% over 2022, while digital library use increased 3%. This Total Content Usage is also 5,100 more than the 2019 Total Usage of 97,690, our pre-pandemic benchmark year.
- Answered 3,565 reference questions, 600 more than 2022 and over 1,200 more than the 2019 pre-covid level. Library staff also provided 3,618 technology help sessions to patrons, a 160% increase over the 2019 level. Questions are answered in-person, by phone and email.
- Served 96,697 patrons in-person and through curbside pickup, a 6% growth over 2022. The additional number of patrons using virtual services is not measured.
- Hosted 15,677 WiFi sessions, a 7% decrease from 2022's total, while use of the library computers (4,009) was a modest 1% increase.
- Sponsored 581 cultural programs that attracted 10,685 attendees. This attendance
 is 23% higher than 2022's total, and over 340 (3%) more than the 2019 attendance
 figure. (It is noteworthy that the majority of these events 323 are geared toward
 children and teens.)
- Community-sponsored events (meetings, etc., not hosted by the library) totaled 533, with the attendance estimate of 3,127. These events increased 71% and attendance increased 18% over 2022. This is 9% over the community usage pre-covid in 2019.

It remains our honor to provide residents of and visitors to the Blue Hill Peninsula with professional library services, particularly in this day and age when such services are on the decrease in many parts of the country. Thanks to our diverse funding model, this is accomplished with minimal impact on taxpayers.

The library is a community asset for everyone and we hope that you take full advantage of its many services. For more information, please reach out anytime;

Peninsula Ambulance Corps 2023 Report to the Towns We began 2023 with the hope that the effects of the COVID pandemic would fade and under the leadership of our Manager, Alan Henschke, we would continue to reorganize our business model to improve efficiency and to match our staffing model with call volume patterns.

COVID continues to place a strain on the service. Continued outbreaks, increased use of personal protection supplies, and staff illnesses all created strains on our operations. Inflation and staffing continue to be our greatest challenges. The cost of doing business has increased due to inflation. Fuel, medical supplies and almost everything we use to provide our services have increased in cost. Our call volume is increasing, and we have not been able to increase staff sufficiently to cover the shifts. This has led to continued overtime and to management having to cover open shifts. Despite these challenges, PAC continued to provide services and adjust our practices to compensate for the increased cost of doing business. In addition, we continue to improve employee wages to remain competitive.

Our largest payors remain Medicare (federal government) and Medicare/MaineCare (state government). Together they represent 37% of our payors. However, for every \$1 of that billing, we are paid \$0.38 at best. This accounts for most of our operating deficit. If we include all payors, we still are only paid \$0.46 for every \$1 billed. This is a national issue and impacts rural services, such as ours, particularly hard. We continue to support state and national efforts to improve EMS reimbursement rates.

We are proud of our nine full-time and twelve part-time and per-diem staff – the Paramedics and $\,$

EMTs who make the program work. They have been steadfast during these trying times. We continue to provide staff with continuing education for federal and state mandated classes. Our employees like their jobs and provide real benefit to the communities we serve. We added one full time EMT in 2023 and maintained the same number of employees as 2022. This has reduced overtime; but we still need more paramedics and EMTs on our staff. EMS staffing is an issue in the state and nationwide. We continue to explore recruitment and retention solutions.

Our fleet of three ambulances allows us to maintain our staffing model of two on duty ambulances with a spare to use when the others need service. This also allows us to staff the third ambulance for local events, such as the Blue Hill Fair, and in times of increased call volume. We utilize management to staff the third ambulance during high-volume times, which allows us to respond to more calls.

Totals by town are given in the chart below. Inter-hospital patient transports, which were 35.8% of call volume, are also included in call totals.

We decrease our deficit in three ways; with the support of our town governments, by individual donations to our annual appeal, and by using volunteer board members to accomplish administrative and fund-raising tasks.

This year we are asking for \$23.50 for the operating budget (an increase of \$2.00) and \$4.50 (an increase of \$0.50) for the ambulance reserve fund per capita. This is a per capita total of \$29.00.

We need more staff in a very difficult labor market. And we must keep the people that we have. We simply must pay our people what they are worth if we are to keep them. Potential new staff must balance that remarkable dedication to an essential calling with feeding their family . . . paying for heat. This year's requested increase will help go to increase wages.

Staff and ambulances are the visible aspects of PAC, but community loyalty and the funds provided by the towns are its lifeblood. Our annual appeal to the public provides an essential and remarkably consistent source of support, but we must rely to the greatest extent on the common sense of town governments and citizens to understand the necessity for an ambulance service, and that, if we don't hang together and make it work, no one else will.

Sedgwick Elementary School Principal's Report January 2024

My first year serving as principal of SES has proved to be inspiring! The students here are exceptionally welcoming, cooperative and community oriented. This is exemplified in their behavior during morning meetings and our Friday all school assemblies. Students are quick to problem solve and get back to work and play. The environment fosters a family atmosphere that supports academic and social growth.

Upon my arrival at SES, the staff requested more professional development on Social Emotional Learning (SEL) topics. Since then, we have garnered funds for a 4 day workshop in Responsive Classroom techniques and a series of professional development on Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS). In addition, teachers are using Wayfinder as a direct teaching method for SEL instruction.

Our teachers are also developing our literacy program in the lower wing. One of the latest trends in literacy is to combine strong guided reading with additional phonics instruction. While we are strengthening our current guided reading programs, we have

added a phonics instruction curriculum this year. This phonics program is being taught in grades K-5.

Teachers have been using the Eureka Math program to teach math K-8 for about 5 years. Because our results are not where we would like them, we are beginning to explore other options for math instruction. It is possible that the upper wing will be using another more relevant and engaging program while the lower wing choses something that works for younger students. We are looking into several options and two teachers are currently piloting other programs.

The Science Technology, Engineering, Art and Math (STEAM) program continues to thrive. All classes participate in weekly activities that are relevant to classroom curriculum. For instance, students are learning to create three dimensional topographic maps from a two dimensional map of Mt. Desert Island. Once the three dimensional maps are all created, students will choose a hike to go on based on the level of difficulty. Students visibly thrive on this type of instruction as demonstrated by their discussions of the work during lunch and recess.

The Sedgwick Elementary School building is in need of repairs. We are using a Sealander planning document to determine projects to prioritize. We struggled to find someone to replace the outgoing Head of Maintenance at SES. We have recently filled this position and are seeing our school shine. We are working to prioritize daily maintenance and cleaning activities with longer range projects that can be handled by our staff. Union 76 staff have been helping us with small repairs. In the short run, we will be able to take care of some of the Sealander projects.

This school year, we were able to expand our After School Program with the support of the $21^{\rm st}$ Century Schools grant. So far, this program has had excellent attendance! Student time is divided between tailored academic support and special programming such as ukulele club.

School Union 76 Superintendent's Report January, 2024

Dear Sedgwick Community.

I hope this letter finds you all well. To begin, I will provide you with some basic information about the Sedgwick School:

- We have 13 teachers, of which 4 are part-time
- We have 7 full-time support staff
- There are 75 students currently enrolled in grades PreK-8
- For administrators on site, there is one full-time Principal, who also teaches a section of math
- District level administration services are provided via the Central Office of School Union 76, including the Superintendent, Special Education Director, Business Manager, and Payroll Manager

- Sedgwick Elementary is identified as a Tier 3 school through the Maine Department of Education, and receives additional funding to support improvements in student math scores
- Sedgwick has school choice since the school only goes up to 8th grade. Most local students choose to attend George Stevens Academy for their high school years In terms of staffing changes for this current year (FY 23-24) we have seen the addition of Principal Susan Wells as the building leader for the school and a new classroom teacher at the grade K-2 level. While maintenance staffing has been a challenge through most of the current year, we have recently hired a permanent maintenance person and contracted additional services in the later evening so that we have staffing available throughout most of the operational hours of the school.

Going into the next year (FY 24-25) we have received two retirement notices, one from Ms. Susan Reilly, and the other from Mr. Dwayne Carter. We thank both of them for their service to the school, and while we will miss them, we also wish them a happy retirement. These positions remain in the budget for next year and we are in the process of posting and receiving applications at the time of this writing.

In the State of Maine, there is a current shortage of teachers and support staff virtually everywhere. Sedgwick is no exception. We have had great difficulty in particular with staffing special education positions (teacher and Ed Techs). This comes at a time where there are more students coming into Sedgwick who need additional services, and are entitled to them by law. We currently need to fill a full time Ed Tech and full time teacher position in special education. These positions are currently unfilled with no applicants expressing interest. In addition to filling these positions, we will also need to add two more ed techs and another full time special education teacher for next year. These will be difficult to fill, and represent a significant increase to the proposed budget for next year.

Additional budget impacts on this year include the need to renegotiate the teacher, support staff, and transportation contracts. This was a timeline left to me by previous superintendents, and I find it regrettable that the impact of these is being felt at the same time. However, I must also point out that Sedgwick currently falls towards the bottom of Maine schools in terms of teacher and staff compensation. This is a dynamic which must change in order for us to be able to attract and retain professional staff.

* At the time when the School Board was required to approve a budget for next year, the amount of the subsidy from the Maine Department of Education was not known, nor was the required minimum that the town must raise in taxes in order to get the State subsidy (these are still unknown at the time of this writing). These amounts are announced in the ED 279 form produced by the MDOE, and that form is typically not available until late January at the earliest. Likewise, the audit for the school is not completed, and the full amount of the surplus balance (which could be used to offset the impact of the next school budget) is not available for consideration by the School Board. A limited balance forward amount was nonetheless embedded by the Board, but the risk is finding out the funds are not actually available in the estimated amount. Nonetheless, we kept to the deadline set forth by the Town, but I must be clear that a more conservative budget may have been possible by waiting for certain information and notices to become available.

As you will see, the proposed School Budget for next year is in the amount of \$3,406,449.58. This represents an impact to taxpayers of 10.42% over last year. Bringing a budget forward with this much of an increase was not an easy matter for the School Board. Factors that led to such an increase include:

- Rising cost of special education services
- Teacher contract negotiations
- Support staff contract negotiations
- Transportation contract negotiations
- Increase in private tuition for students in grades 9-12

In terms of the school facility itself, we are in the process of repairing the roof over the library. We have also just received an evaluation of the boiler from the inspector, indicating that the model of boiler the school has is no longer made. If the boiler breaks down, parts must now come from companies who remove boilers and keep spare parts on hand. If there are no such parts, the boiler will have to be replaced. If this were to happen mid-year, we would not be able to run school in Sedgwick until those replacements/repairs could be completed, however long that would be.

I am forming a Building Maintenance committee that will begin meeting soon to further assess the needs of the building and propose a maintenance and equipment replacement schedule for consideration by the School Board. If any folks in the community are interested in serving on the committee, I would encourage you to contact us.

George Stevens Academy Annual Report to the Community January 2024

Dear Town Residents,

I write with much gratitude to be serving as the interim Head of School for the peninsula's town academy. I have learned much in my short time here, and one of the certainties I now have is how important this school is to the peninsula. I see first hand what it means to alumni, to young families who move here in the hopes of building a community around their children's local school, and to the neighbors who watch students grow up and return to meaningful work in local businesses. GSA holds a unique place in the history of the Blue Hill peninsula, and I am proud to have a window into the ways it prepares for its future.

I'm happy to share the following facts about the school today:

• I'm proud to document some of the many ways our students contribute to the well-being of the community. Each graduate must complete 60 hours of community service. In addition, student council has organized a food drive, raised funds for H.O.M.E. and delivered winter sand buckets for those who couldn't otherwise have sand for their sidewalks and driveways. Our musicians have played for the Blue Hill

Fair, craft fairs, parades, library events, and holiday concerts. Advisory groups read to elementary school students. And we have hosted a middle school dance, basketball game, and game night that help our peninsula middle school students get to know one another.

- This year saw a dramatic increase in volunteer participation in the school. This includes two weekend "work days," a new Booster Club, landscapers, the installation of student art, Friends of the Dorm who help make our boarders feel welcome and entertained, and a cadre of folks who are ready to write, photograph and edit. And of course, our history was rewritten by the alumni who stepped forward with expertise, labor and materials to save the west wing of the gymnasium building . . . at no cost to the school. Equally transformative is the Blue Hill Public Library's donation of sixteen librarian hours per week.
- 256 students are enrolled as I write with the following breakdown: Blue Hill 99; Brooklin 17; Brooksville 37; Castine 15; Hancock 1; Orland 6; Penobscot 17; Sedgwick 34; Surry 31. Six students board at GSA, and 3 pay privately.
- Our Board of Trustees includes Sally Mills '85 Chair, Blue Hill; Deb Ludlow '79, Vice Chair, Brooksville; Tony Politano, Treasurer, Castine; Bill Case, Clerk, Blue Hill; Sara Becton Ardrey, Blue Hill; Amy Baker, Blue Hill; Alden Blodgett, '78, Penobscot; K. Guinness, Blue Hill; Wilson King, Blue Hill, Tyler Knowles, Blue Hill; Susan Loomis, Castine; Robyn Sealander, Brooklin; Liffey Thorpe, Brooksville. The board actively seeks representation from all peninsula towns and welcomes any nominations.
- Our board voted to end our boarding program in June. This has allowed them to
 focus on selling property no longer necessary for the school's use. We hope to
 provide the same cultural diversity achieved in boarding through homestays and
 will love hearing from anyone interested in hosting a student next year.
- Significant focus on the school's facilities has begun with the repair work on the west wing and ultimate removal of the east wing of the gymnasium building to make way for an improved entrance and bus drop-off and pick-up.

Finally, we thank you in advance for the support you can provide through our very necessary request of \$1,700 per student for supplemental tuition. It is the same request as last year, so no additional tax burden will ensue.

George Stevens Academy Financial Update 2022-2023

Dear Citizens of the Blue Hill Peninsula,

We happily share this financial update for George Stevens Academy. We hope you agree that the school is a cornerstone of the educational and cultural activities in our community, and we hope that this information can strengthen our combined efforts to maximize what we provide for the students in seven sending towns and beyond.

Again last year the citizens in our sending towns approved supplemental tuition beyond the state's minimum, and for that we are deeply grateful. As of this writing, the Maine Department of Education set the average cost per high school student in Hancock County at \$220,233 in 2021 (the latest figure available from the MDOE). That year, the state-set tuition was \$11,951. Public monies account for 76% of GSA revenue, and the supplemental tuition is essential to allowing us to serve all our students well. Last year our request for the supplemental tuition was approved by a significant majority: 71% approved the supplement. We cannot thank you enough.

Total tuition and fees from the fiscal year ending 6/30/23 came to \$4,297,780. The bulk of the remainder of GSA operating revenues in 2022-2023 came from fundraising (\$712,941 unrestricted and restricted) and monies drawn from the endowment (698,718), as reported in the audit available on our website.

We continue to work with the Budget Review Committee (BRC) with representatives from each town. This group received the same first budget draft as the GSA Board of Trustees, and over the next three months had the opportunity to review it and subsequent drafts, ask questions, and make suggestions. They were given the final budget which although the BRC did approve it, was adopted in October. It includes a \$20,000 surplus, and while this does not provide the reserve we will always aim for, we do have board funds that we can access in an emergency. The surplus was hard fought, and I am glad we could end in this place. The budget is lean but responsibly funds the staff and programs the community expected. The process of developing the 2024-2025 GSA budget has commenced

The 2023-2024 education cost for our 246 day students is budgeted at \$5,009,041. As approved in January 2024, the state tuition for 2023-2024 accounts for \$3,432,937. GSA is very appreciative that the sending towns approved the supplemental tuition of \$418,200, which will help ensure the budget is balanced for the year.

Another very important source of revenue for GSA are the gifts and contributions from the extraordinary generosity of alumni, families, and friends. Over many years, this philanthropy has created the endowment, which provides annual income to support operations. In addition, contributions to the GSA Fund grew in excess of 26% last year. Total gifts and contributions were \$712,941 in 2022-2023. These gifts ensure a unique educational program to serve all students from the peninsula with a range of academic and career aspirations.

This report offers one more chance to express GSA's appreciation for such necessary support of our town academy. We cannot be the GSA you count on without you.
